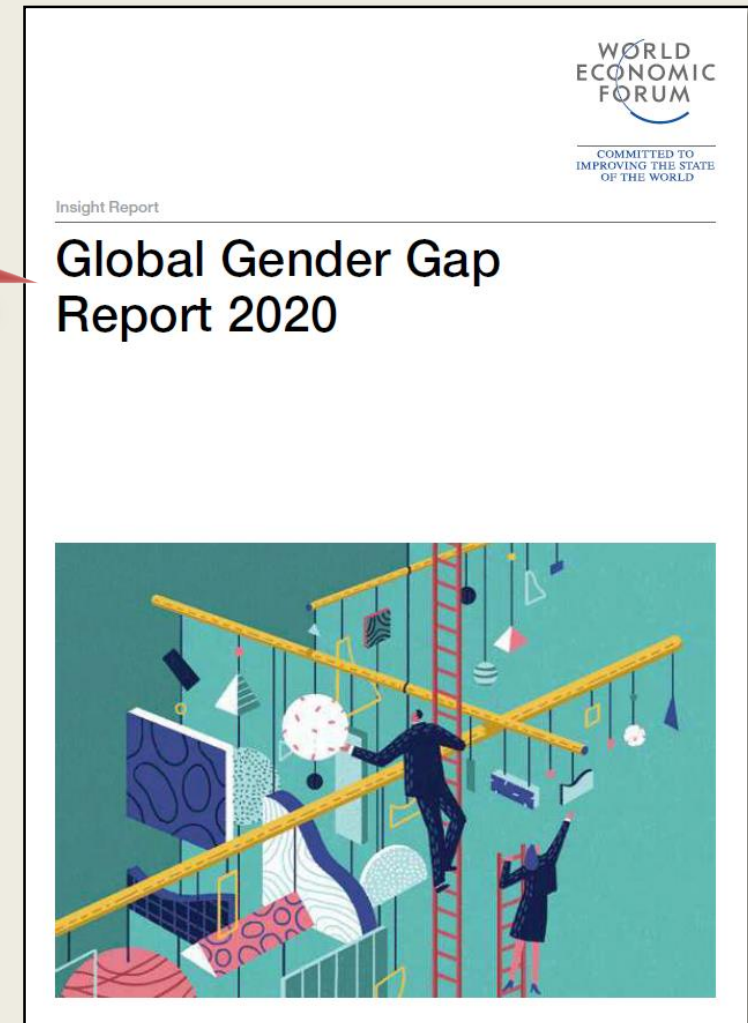

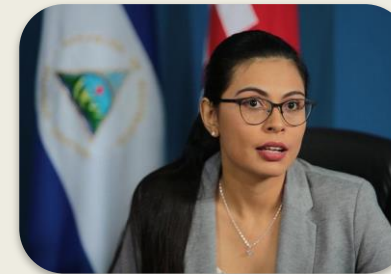

There are 3,446,640 young people of both sexes with leading participation, bringing food, volunteer work and various social activities.



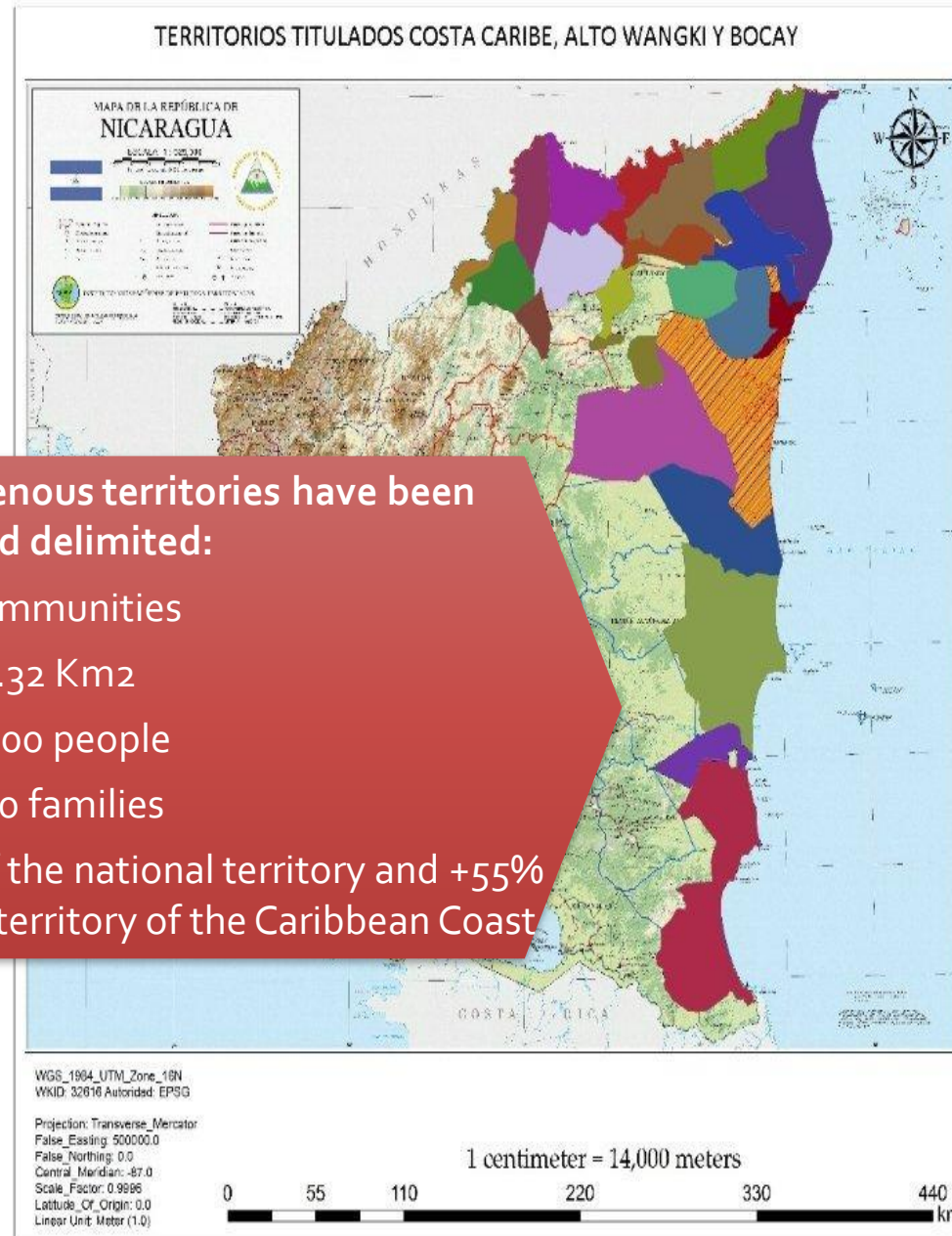

Demarcation and titling of indigenous territories

Communal lands in Nicaragua have special protections: they are unattachable, imprescriptible and non-transferable.

23 indigenous territories have been titled and delimited:

- 314 Communities
- 37,859.32 Km²
- +200,000 people
- +35,000 families
- 31% of the national territory and +55% of the territory of the Caribbean Coast



The territory demarcated and titled in favor of the Indigenous and Afro-descendant Communities of the Nicaraguan Caribbean Coast is equivalent to:

1.8 times the territory of El Salvador: 21,041 Km²

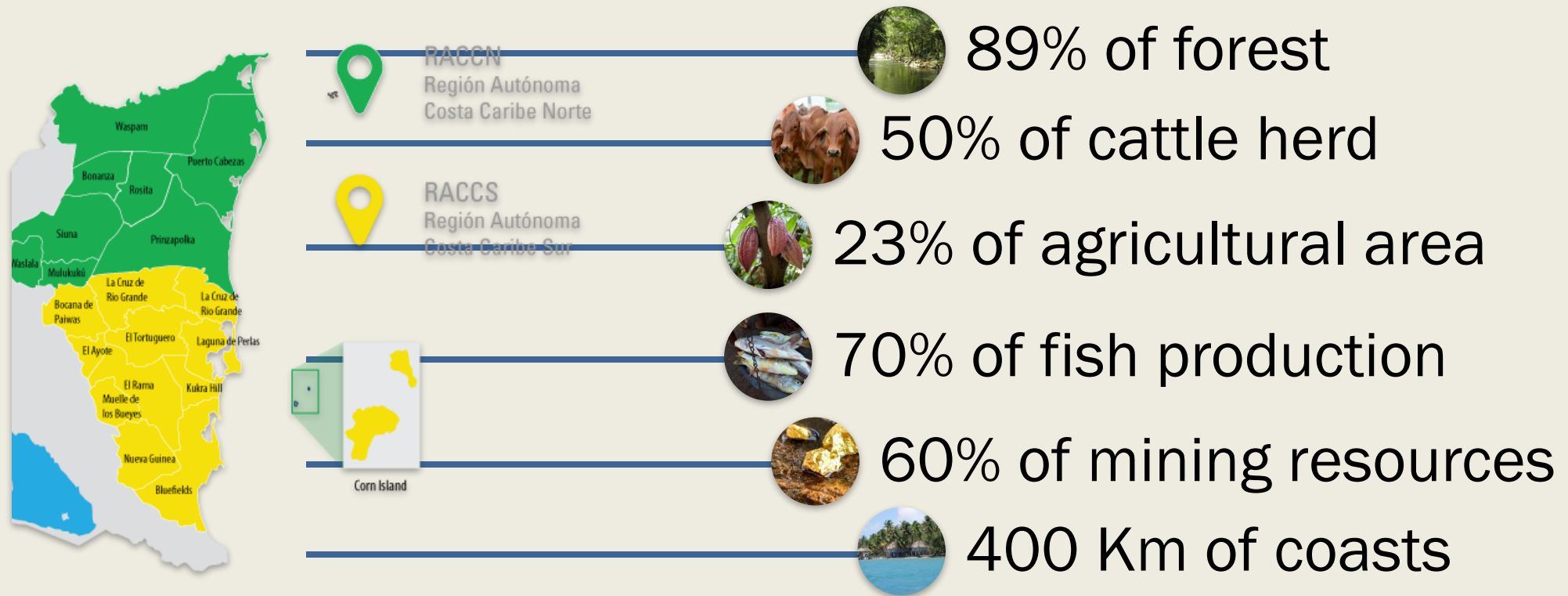


1.2 times the territory of Belgium: 30,689 Km²



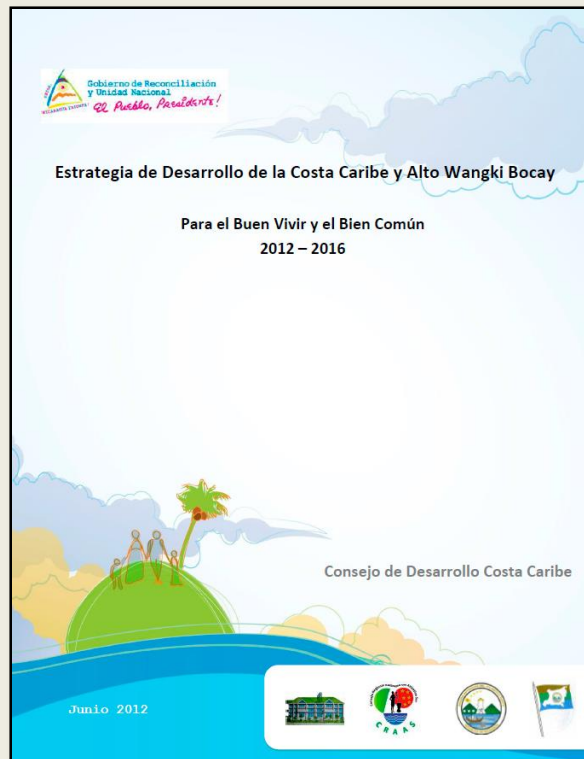

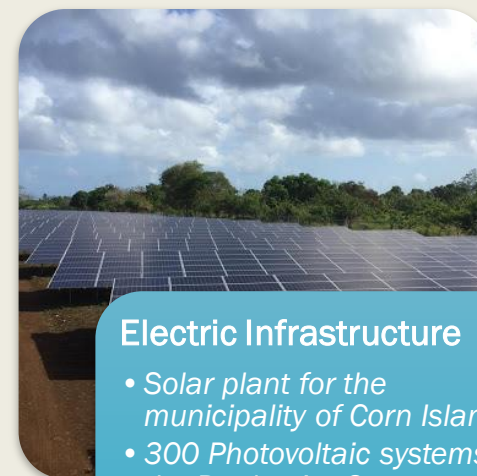
Economic infrastructure

- Maintenance of more than 300 km of roads
- Construction and rehabilitation of 2,415 km of rural roads and 157 vehicular and pedestrian bridges



Road infrastructure

- Nueva Guinea - Bluefields Highway (68 Km)
- El Rama Section - Pearl Lagoon - Kukra Hill Junction (90 Km)
- Río Blanco - Siuna - Bilwi - Waspán Highway (126 Km)



Electric Infrastructure

- Solar plant for the municipality of Corn Island
- 300 Photovoltaic systems in the Productive Sector to apply in drip irrigation in Siuna, Rosita, Bonanza, Bocana de Paiwas, Mulukukú and Prinzapolka
- 10 small solar plants in Mulukukú, Siuna and Waspán

Investments in road infrastructure

The road connection between the Pacific and Central Regions with the Caribbean Region constitutes a significant historical event for Nicaragua.

To this, we add the Road Corridor Projects on the Northern Caribbean Coast and Southern Caribbean Coast, to communicate with each other, with the communities of the Caribbean Coast and with the rest of the country.

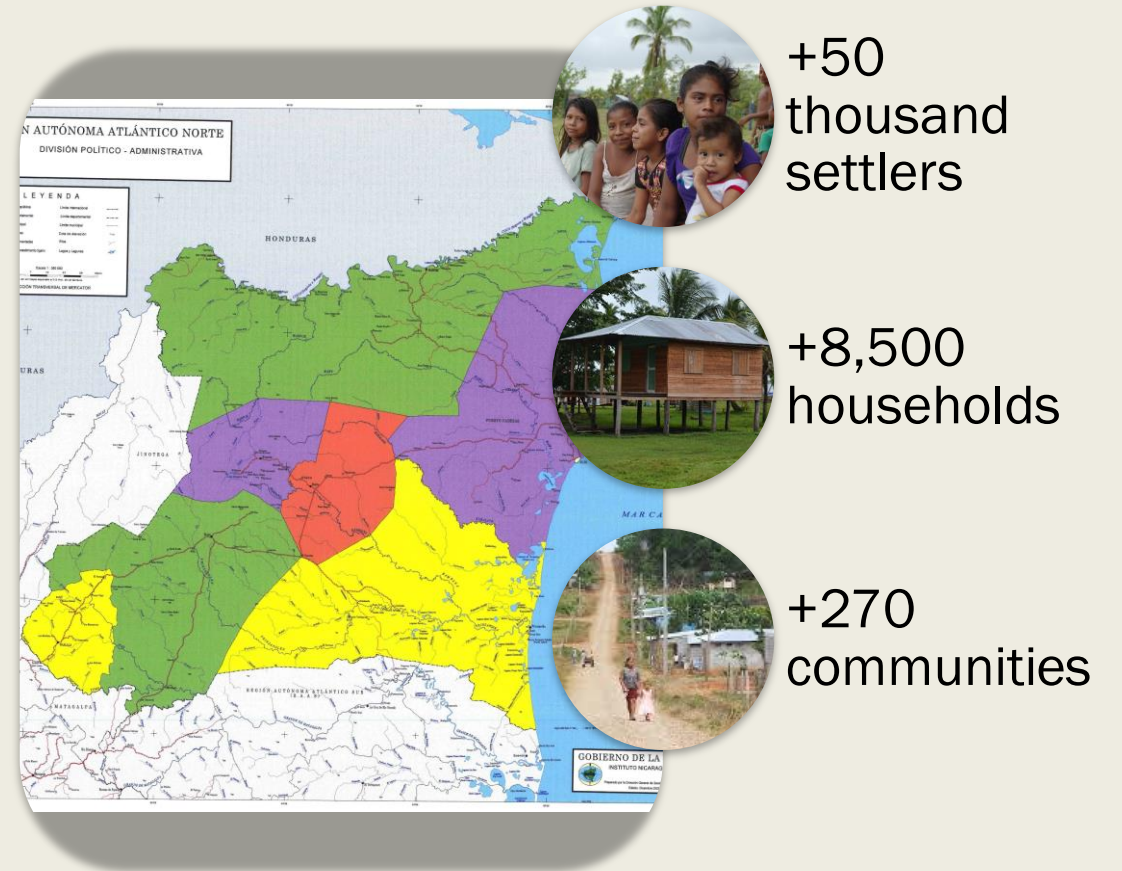

Electricity coverage in the Autonomous Region of the Northern Caribbean Coast increased

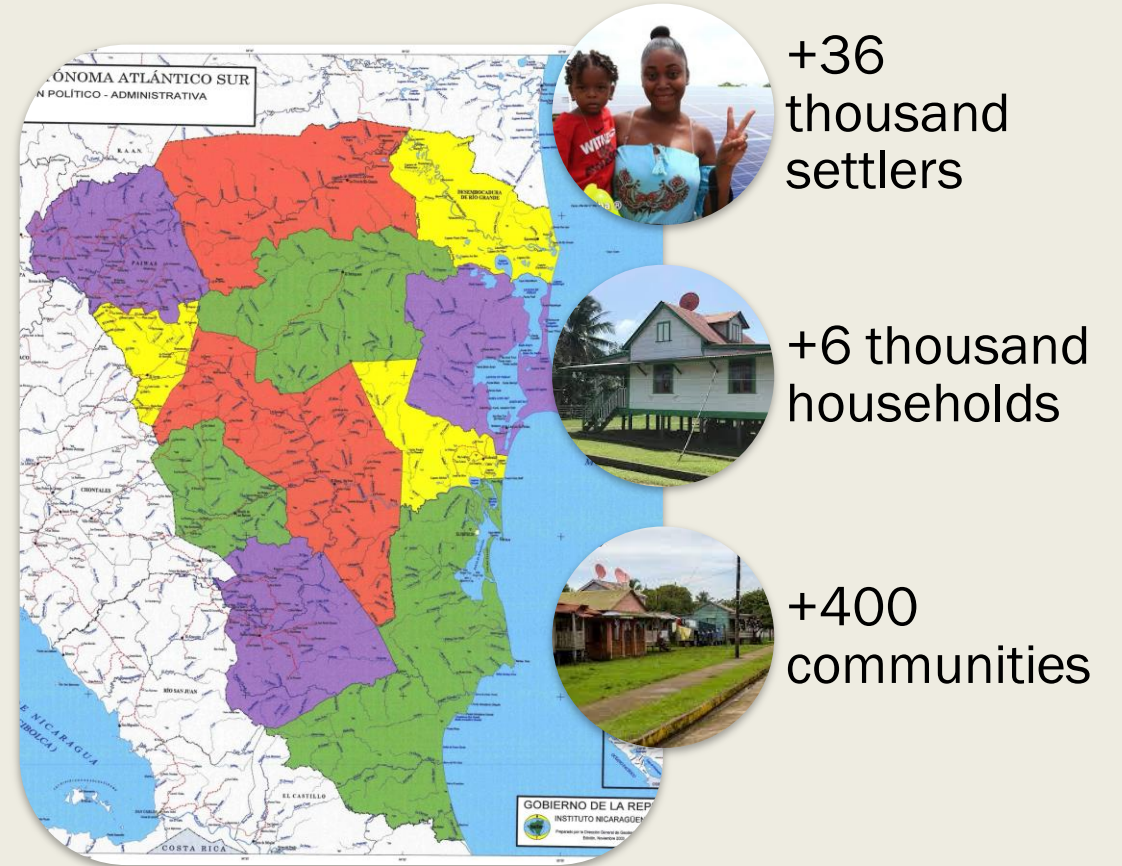
- From 17.6% in 2007

Electricity coverage in the Autonomous Region of the Southern Caribbean Coast increased

- From 39.3% in 2007
- To 98.0% in 2020



Renewable energies for the communities of the Caribbean Coast

Corn Island (RACCS)



- Solar plant with hybrid system, provides solar energy 24 hours a day through solar panels, with a battery bank and backup diesel plants.
- Investment of US \$ 7.3 million

Photovoltaic systems



- 300 Photovoltaic Systems in the Productive Sector to apply drip irrigation
- Municipalities of Siuna, Rosita, Bonanza, Bocana de Paiwas, Mulukukú and Prinzapolka (RACCN)

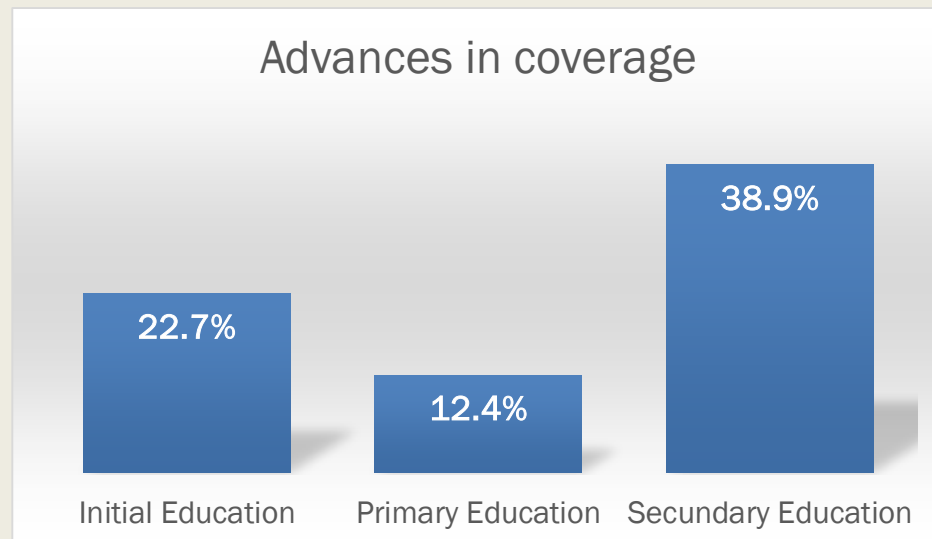
