The restitution of the right to drinking water, sewerage and sanitation

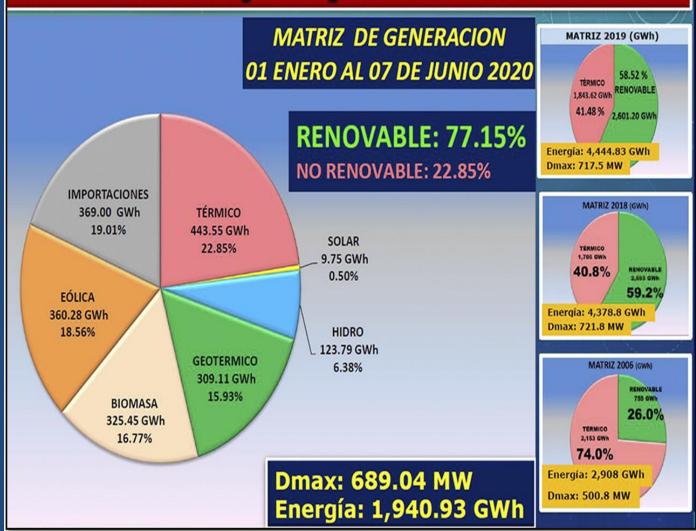

In 2020, more than 77% of the energy consumed in the country is generated from renewable sources.

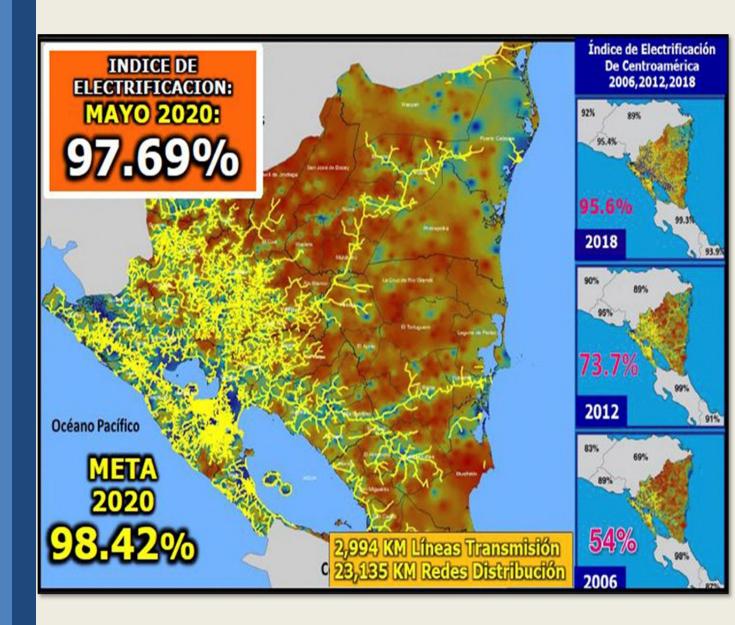
MATRIZ DE GENERACION 2006, 2018, 2019 Y 2020

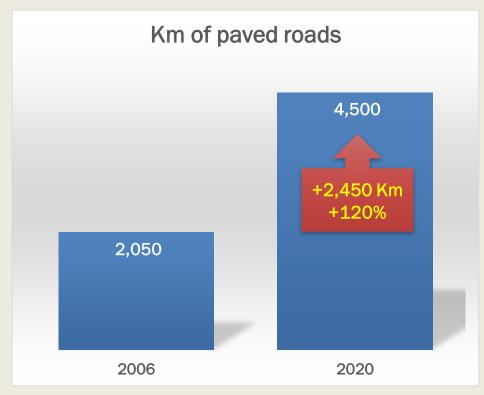
In 2006, 54% of Nicaraguan families had electricity in their homes.

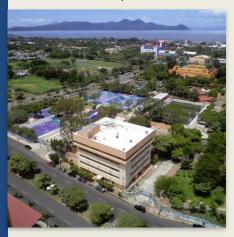

Nicaragua advocates for the recognition of Losses and Damages

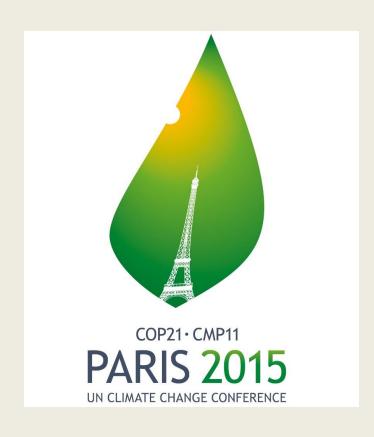


Creation of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Losses and Damages, with the active participation of Nicaragua, overcoming the resistance of the United States.



There was a great effort by several States, with Nicaraguan leadership, who actively sought contributions and formulas to solve the impasses, all blocked by the United States.

COP 21 - Paris, 2015



- Developed countries proposed 2°C as a target and developing countries 1°C as a target.
- Nicaragua and Bolivia negotiated 1.5°C instead of 1°C, that was accepted by the COP and the Paris Agreement proposes to stop the rise in temperature by less than 2°C and preferably by 1.5°C.

COP 21 - Paris, 2015





In October 2017, Nicaragua signed our country's accession to the Paris Agreement, because there was already consensus among the vast majority of countries that the 2015 commitments were insufficient and more ambition was expected, a position that remains in force and was even the main issue of the COP25 in Madrid, and which the UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres called "The COP of Ambition".

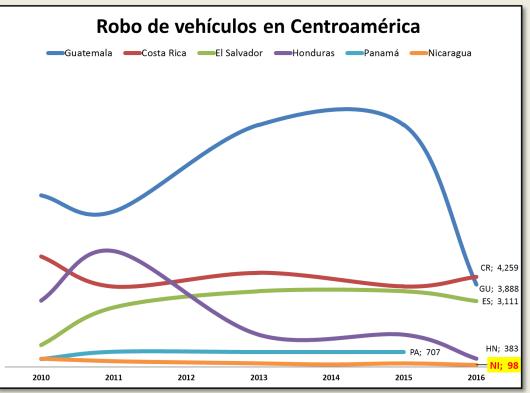

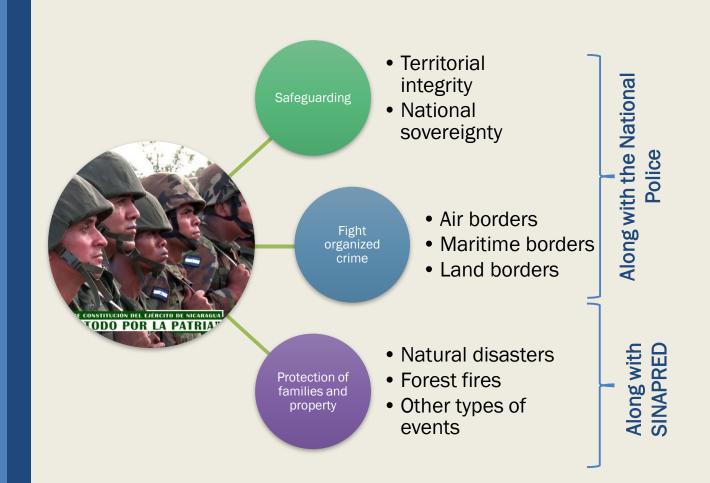
